Members and Friends of Ely United Methodist Church,

Greetings from Pastor Craig!

I traveled the same stretch of road between Jacobson and Park Rapids twice in three weeks recently. The change in the autumn color was noticeable.

During the first trip (September 19) the red and orange hardwoods were at peak color. I enjoyed seeing mile after mile of picture-postcard views along this mostly deserted stretch of road. But by October 9 the reds were looking pretty dull. What caught my attention this time was how on some trees the leaves were part yellow and part green, on others the leaves were still mostly green, and still others the leaves were already mostly yellow. It was an interesting variety.

If I were to travel down this stretch of road near the end of the month, I'm guessing the leaves will be almost completely yellow, except for the oaks that will be reddish-brown. By Thanksgiving the trees will be completely bare, again except for those stubborn oaks.

For many years it's seemed to me that autumn in Minnesota divides itself into three "sub seasons," with some overlap.

- Early autumn, which can almost feel like late summer, occupies most of September even in northern Minnesota. There is bright sunshine (most of the time), warm temperatures, school is just starting, flowers in outside pots still thrive, and only the early-bird maples have turned color. We may get a few nights with frost warnings. Farmers are checking fields and getting machinery ready for the upcoming harvest.
- Mid-autumn, is when leaves turn color with increasing speed and begin to fall. The first
 killing frost typically hits hard about this time. Harvest is in full swing and anyone
 traveling through farming country is treated to an enjoyable spectacle, but the trade-off
 is you have to allow extra time for your trip in case you end up behind farm equipment
 on the road. Up North, hunting shacks and deer stands are made ready by eager
 hunters.
- Deep-autumn is when there is no kidding ourselves any longer winter is just around the corner. We are smack-dab in the middle of hunting season. Most early snowfalls melt off, but not always. Extended cold snaps aren't unusual. When I lived in farm country on days when the high temperatures were in the teens and accompanied by a bitter wind, and a countryside empty of crops felt somber and bleak.

I mention this because I've long been fascinated by the "many faces" of autumn, but will also make a further connection, tying this in with life and faith. Full disclosure: Pastors/preachers

are unable to <u>not</u> make connections between one thing and another. In other words what I see in any one dimension of life reminds sheds light on how I experience another part of life.

So, here's the connection. Life doesn't sit still, whether the seasons of the year, our health, how our children are doing in school, or the joys and challenges we are experiencing. Life is always on the move, as is our own self-understanding, and our capacity to respond to all that's going on.

I don't think I noticed this much at all when I was between 25 and 45 and helping to raise my two sons. There was so much going on in our family and as I charted my course as a pastor that the rest was a blur for me, despite my best attempts to pay attention.

It's almost the opposite now that I'm older, live alone, and with my family a long way away. There's too much time for pondering, for reflecting on life, family, and ministry.

As we watch Jesus interacting with people in the Gospels, he always meets them right where they are. Rich or poor, healthy or infirm, sinner or saint, coming to him in desperation or playing games in order to trap him, it's all the same. He embraces them and with compassion touches their deepest need in that moment. And Jesus does the same for each of us today who come to him with outstretched arms and an open heart.

¹⁸⁻²¹ That's why I don't think there's any comparison between the present hard times and the coming good times. The created world itself can hardly wait for what's coming next. Everything in creation is being more or less held back. God reins it in until both creation and all the creatures are ready and can be released at the same moment into the glorious times ahead. Meanwhile, the joyful anticipation deepens.

²²⁻²⁵ All around us we observe a pregnant creation. The difficult times of pain throughout the world are simply birth pangs. But it's not only around us; it's within us. The Spirit of God is arousing us within. We're also feeling the birth pangs. These sterile and barren bodies of ours are yearning for full deliverance. That is why waiting does not diminish us, any more than waiting diminishes a pregnant mother. We are enlarged in the waiting. We, of course, don't see what is enlarging us. But the longer we wait, the larger we become, and the more joyful our expectancy.

²⁶⁻²⁸ Meanwhile, the moment we get tired in the waiting, God's Spirit is right alongside helping us along. If we don't know how or what to pray, it doesn't matter. He does our praying in and for us, making prayer out of our wordless sighs, our aching groans. He knows us far better than we know ourselves, knows our pregnant condition, and keeps us present before God. That's why we can be so sure that every detail in our lives of love for God is worked into something good.
