A Note from Pastor Craig

Greetings on another gorgeous day! We've had "pop-pop" thunderstorms off and on for a couple weeks, but all in all the weather has been enjoyable in July, especially when we consider the heat domes and severe weather visiting much of the United States. My heart goes out to those who have had major disruptions to their lives.

The pews have been full the last two Sundays in worship at our church with enthusiastic singing and participation. I enjoy the mix of year-round residents, summer residents, and those who are in town for several Sundays. Renewing acquaintances with multiple generations of summer folks whose parents and grandparents spent all or part of a summer here are joy-filled and bring back many memories.

Speaking of worship, occasionally I make references to social or political events in sermons and prayers. Some churches and clergy feel it's important to speak often about what's happening in our country and in the world. And to make specific statements about what Christians should think about these issues and events.

I am not one of those pastors and I don't think this is a value our congregation holds either. In my view speaking in forceful ways about issues from a particular perspective doesn't acknowledge that most issues are complex and they don't yield to simple, easily enacted decisions. If they did, we would have solved them years ago.

There are a smaller number of congregations and clergy who believe no mention should be made of the "outside world" at all in worship, because to do so is to taint our faith with the brokenness we experience outside the church doors. This view also falls short in my opinion. Why? "Outside" is where we spend most of our life and Jesus tells us to let our light shine and to love our neighbor, whoever they are.

I believe the purpose of churches and our faith is to worship God, to hear his Word as it comes to us through Scripture, hymns, preaching, and prayers, to grow in our love for God and one another (we call this Christian fellowship), *and* to learn to think about our lives in light of our faith - all of it, which means politics and social issues.

I am in middle of the road theologically and politically, not because it's expedient as a pastor to "be all things to all people," but because I believe that both conservative and liberal views have an element of truth as well as blind spots.

When I do mention things happening in our country my goal not to make political judgments or advance policy solutions, but to place events of today in what I believe is their larger historical, and specifically Christian context. Pastor Craig

Two Sisters, Mary and Martha, and Jesus

This Sunday, for the second week in a row, we'll hear a story you've probably heard many times before. Last week it was the Parable of the Good Samaritan. This week it's the account of Jesus visiting the home of Mary and Martha.

Our reading from the Gospel of Luke isn't the only reference to Mary and Martha in the New Testament. John's Gospel tells us Mary, Martha, and their brother Lazarus are good friends of Jesus. The tradition is Jesus would often stop by their home for rest, peace, and the gift of understanding. In other words, they knew each other well.

In the reading for Sunday Mary sits at the feet of Jesus to listen and learn from him, while Martha busies herself serving them, and presumably the serving other people who may have been there.

Martha protests to Jesus that Mary has left her to do all the work by herself. Jesus memorable reply to Martha is "Martha, Martha, you are worried and distracted by many things; there is need of only one thing. Mary has chosen the better part, which will not be taken from her."

The obvious takeaway is that while there is a time to work, when Jesus is nearby the priority is to sit at his feet and listen. While this is not untrue, there's so much more in this reading to inspire and teach us all these years later.

Mary and Martha owned a home, something unusual for women of that day. Jesus visits their home. Mary sits at his feet to hear him teach. These are also unusual.
