A Note from Pastor Craig

A Few Miscellaneous Announcements

Sunday school: I announced earlier that Sunday school would start this Sunday, September 11th. My mind was on autopilot when I wrote that; we won't be able hold Sunday school until the basement is more put back together.

Our updated plans are to start Sunday school on September 25th or when things are put together enough in the basement to begin, whichever comes later.

Parents and/or grandparents of Sunday school boys and girls will meet at the church Wednesday, September 28th at 5:00 to discuss the year ahead.

Parish News: There will be no Parish News next week. The next Parish News will be Friday, September 23. Greetings! It's raining today (Friday), but there will be really nice autumn weather on Saturday and Sunday for Harvest Moon festival. And into next week as well. Now begins the transition of leaving behind the unrestrained joys of summer and embracing the more subdued contentments of autumn.

Speaking of autumn, I want to take a few moments to mention something I reread recently from the novel *Jewelweed*, a vibrant book with an autumn theme and an autumn-like painting on the cover.

Jewelweed is the second of two novels set in the wild and rugged Driftless area that covers portions of Wisconsin, Iowa, Illinois, and Minnesota. The first novel, *Driftless*, and *Jewelweed* follow a set of sturdy characters seeking to expand themselves to fully fill their own lives, relationship networks, and the small rural community where they live. A third book, *Painting Beyond Walls*, that follows the same characters will be released this coming Tuesday.

Near the end of *Jewelweed*, Blake and Dart, separated by sudden and unfortunate circumstances a decade earlier, but who still care about each other, are poised to possibly be reunited. Dart goes to a person she trusts and says: "*And do you think that people can ever be forgiven for what they don't know about themselves, for paying too much attention to what frightens them and too little to what makes them happy?"* (Jewelweed, p. 417.)

A central tenant of our faith is "yes, we can be forgiven" - whether for what we know or don't know about ourselves. The Apostle Paul comes to mind immediately in this regard. He says in one reading for this Sunday: "But I received mercy because I had acted ignorantly in unbelief." (I Timothy 1:14)

The novel *Jewelweed* isn't explicitly religious, but each character in the book is carried by their openness to grace and to each other to a more vibrant and joyful place than they were when the story began. They find a way to pay more attention to what makes them joyful and less to what they're afraid of.

It seems as though there's a fair amount of fear floating around in many places today. Fear of the future, fear of each other, fear for our loved ones, fear that our institutions are failing, fear that the challenges we face are larger than our ability to solve them; well, the list goes on and on.

Paying attention to what we love brings risk along with it. On the other hand, it is a better way. And as John, the one of the Twelve Disciples, says in his first letter: "Perfect love casts out all fear."

Scripture Readings for Sunday from I Timothy and Luke

Jesus' death and resurrection happened around 30 A.D. While alive, Jesus preached a message of good news, which included salvation beyond death through faith in Jesus Christ, the arrival of the kingdom of God in our midst now, and the eventual completion of all things with his Coming Again at some time in the future.

His earliest followers focused their efforts on preaching the Good News, caring for the poor and widows in their midst, and inviting others, Jew and Gentile alike, to have faith in Jesus Christ. They felt urgency, because the message had life and death implications and they had expectations that Jesus would return in their lifetime. The gospel accounts of Jesus' life and the letters of Paul reflect these concerns.

Three New Testament letters (I Timothy, II Timothy, and Titus) were written much later, around 90 A.D, and have a different focus. They provide instructions regarding false teaching and church leadership. The writers want to ensure the stability of churches and know that churches cannot thrive without strong leadership and sound teaching. In fact, without both churches may even face challenges to survive. For this reason these letters are known the Pastoral Epistles - they give advice to churches for the long haul.

Our Church Committees Get Busy Again in September

Our Administrative Council, United Methodist Women (UMW), and other committees take a well-deserved rest during the summer. We meet regularly and work diligently throughout the school year, but during the summer, well, like all of us, our committee members are enjoying community events, their families, and the great outdoors.
