A Note from Pastor Craig

Greetings! "Mother Nature" hasn't decided just yet if our March weather will be more like lion or a lamb. So far it's been pretty mild, but since one never knows about the weather, I won't travel even to Virginia without first checking both the weather forecast and road conditions. This unpredictability is part of the vexation (and fun?) of this time of year.

Since last Wednesday, when I returned from my private retreat at St. John's Abbey in Collegeville, MN, I've found myself once again reflecting often on the Book of Psalms in the Bible.

I've known about the Psalms since I was 8 years old. Our third grade Sunday school teacher asked us to open the Bibles we'd recently received to the middle. Most of us found we had turned to Book of Psalms. Psalm 117 is the 595th chapter in the Bible, which is also the middle chapter of the Bible's 1189 chapters. It is also the shortest chapter in the entire Bible.

The Book of Psalms is the "prayerbook of the Bible." I also like to think of it as the "heartbeat" of the Bible. I know it becomes this for me a little bit more all the time.

Jesus was intimately familiar with the Psalms and they were a big part of the language he used when he talked to the one he called "his Heavenly Father." The words "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me" that he cried out as he was dying on the cross are first sentence of Psalm 22. He chose these already-existing words to express himself in this most personal of moments.

Dietrich Bonhoeffer, the brilliant young theologian put to death by the Nazi's in 1944, wrote a slim volume on the Psalms entitled: *Prayerbook of the Bible: An Introduction to the Psalms.* The editor writes in the book's introduction that "In pondering the Psalms Bonhoeffer both encountered the power of God *and experienced the passion within his own heart.*" (Italics are my emphasis.)

Wow - that's a compelling and powerful statement, isn't it?! Isn't this something that we are all hungry for in our lives - "to encounter the power of God and experience the passion within our own heart?"

Bonhoeffer, for his own part, had this to say about the Psalms, writing these words to his parents from his prison cell: "I read the Psalms everyday, as I have done for years; I know them and love them more than any other book." (Continued on page two)

A wide number of commentators note that as we pray the Psalms we find they "put into words the many moods we have in our relationship with God - love and heartbreak, joy and sorrow, and (that) as we pray them we find they are the community's pathway to God."

What Bonhoeffer also sensed is completely new to me - he found the Psalms expressed the special presence of Jesus. Because he knew Jesus prayed the Psalms often, Bonhoeffer felt Jesus praying alongside him in all the complexities of Jesus' own life: Christ "alive, enjoying blessings, suffering, and even crucified anew."

At St. John's Abbey the monks gather at 7:00 a.m., noon, 5:30 and 7:00 p.m. to pray their way out-loud each month through all 150 Psalms and other readings. The monks sit across from each other in two groups either chanting or speaking these words back and forth slowly to each other, pausing in between Psalms. It's a mixture of quiet and the recalling of these ancient words. I experienced their depth and power during my brief time there. I encourage you to makes the Psalms more fully a part of your life. Recent Gift of Additional "Our Faith We Sing" Hymnals

We sing most hymns on Sunday morning from the red hardcover United Methodist Hymnal in our pews, which has a copyright of 1989.

The United Methodist Church has published two additional supplements since: a black softcover (*The Faith We Sing*), copyright 2000, and the green softcover (*Worship & Song*), copyright 2011. Our church purchases a copyright license annually to photocopy songs from these two hymnals and other Christian songs as well, to include as printed inserts in the bulletin.

We've recently received about forty copies of *The Faith We Sing* from the Crane Lake Chapel. They are no longer using the hymnals and gave these to us as a gift. This means we'll no longer need to photocopy songs when we sing from this hymnal. We're not going to add these to our hymn racks in the pews, however, because there isn't enough room. Rather you'll receive a hymnal with your bulletin to return following the service. Every four to six weeks I'll include one of these hymns in our worship service for us to sing.
