**Journeys with the Messiah:** Our church hosted a six week study last fall focusing on viewing photos of Jesus in present-day settings.

## A Note from Pastor Craig

The church season of Epiphany ends this Sunday with our observance of "The Transfiguration of the Lord." This celebration is the exclamation point to the Epiphany season, which began with the Coming of the Wise Men to Bethlehem to worship Jesus.

During Epiphany we traverse a journey, which begin at a house in Bethlehem and ends on a mountain in Galilee. We give thanks each step of the way, recognizing God can draw us from however far we are from God in our lives to the feet of Jesus. What's more, in following Jesus, we embrace God's Beloved Son, who continues in the footsteps of Moses and Elijah.

On Ash Wednesday we enter the church season of Lent, which leads us step by step to the Cross, the very heart of our faith, assuring us God is present with us in up close in every moment. And that God works through all things to accomplish God's purposes.

This recognition is both heartening and sobering. Heartening to know our world belongs to God and not to Satan - the adversary, the evil one. Sobering because sin, evil, and death are so woven into the fabric of the lives of individuals and societies that it's only by Christ taking on the full weight of all that is against life can the powers of darkness be overcome.

Sound overly complicated? Maybe I should have limited myself to the nine words we repeat in unison each time we take Communion.

#### Christ has died, Christ is Risen, Christ will come again!

Our Ash Wednesday service will be a little different this year - quieter, simpler. There will short Scripture readings, short single verse hymns repeated several time, and the imposition of ashes on our foreheads.

The service is a sobering reminder that sin and death is part and parcel of each of our lives. Yet, we also recognize that Lent ends on Easter when we rejoice that God has overcome both in the Resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. I hope you are able to attend the Ash Wednesday Service, February 14th at 7:00 p.m. God is with you. Pastor Craig

#### Dynamite Prayer Article referencing Ely United Methodist Church

The Minnesota Annual Conference has highlighted a United Methodist Church in Minnesota each week during the Dynamite Prayer Initiative. Christa Meland, the Annual Conference Director of Communications, emailed me (Pastor Craig) last week to inquire if she could tell our church's Dynamite Prayer Initiative story. I said "sure," and the two paragraph story below is the result of our email exchange.

In December, Ely UMC member S heri R ue approached her pastor, R ev. Craig Haberman, and Ad Council chair about the Dynamite Prayer Initiative. S he thought it could be an opportunity for the congregation to participate in both spiritual growth and outreach, and they agreed. Ely UMC ordered 250 books, the most of any local church across the area, and distributed them at church, to homes, and by mail, not only to active members but also to summer visitors, those who hadn the been to church for a while, and everyone else in the congregational database. Leaders enthusiastically encouraged participation by individuals and small groups as an opportunity for them to deepen their faith in Christ and their prayer life.

"People's response to our outreach exceeded our expectations," said Haberman. "People who attend church regularly eagerly picked up their book. The people from our congregation we don't see very often expressed their appreciation for us thinking about them and delivering them a book." He even received a grateful phone call from someone who grew up in Ely and has since moved to the Twin Cities metro area. The Dynamite Prayer Initiative also aligns with another emerging priority for the church: encouraging lay people to pray at meetings. "Our congregation is a praying congregation," Haberman said. "We're seeking to make this more visible and widespread. I'm certain the Dynamite Prayer initiative will assist us."

#### Rule of Christ Follow-up

The Rule of Christ workshops our church hosted Sunday, January 21st, were a huge success. John Mueller Nowell presented two workshops, which thirty people attended. Much of the time he stuck to the outline listed in the handouts he provided, but several times went "off script." He also put attendees to work, splitting us up into groups to discuss questions he posed.

Pastor Nowell's evaluation of the workshop was uniformly positive, with one observation: *"This congregation does not have a solid, useable mission statement."* His feedback serves to reinforce the recent decision of our Ad Council to put updating our existing mission statement on our agenda. Our PPRC (Pastor Parish Relations Committee) will also be putting procedures together to incorporate the Rule of Christ in our ongoing life as a church. Watch for future information on both these agenda items.
