Memorial funds can help defray the cost big items too, like the church re-roofing project in 2008. There is a folder available for viewing in the church library that holds a complete record of Memorial gifts.

Every year one Sunday is designated as Memorial Sunday. On that day, we take a few minutes during the worship service to recognize the Memorial gifts of the past year. This year, Memorial Sunday is on May 12<sup>th</sup>.

Please join us in worship on the 12<sup>th</sup> as we celebrate this year's gifts and dedicate them to the memory of our departed loved ones. Stay for fellowship after the service too – there will be cake!

Opening: Pastor Craig provided the "Opening Thought" with thoughts about John 20 and that John 20 is so personal.

**Minutes:** The March Ad Council minutes were approved as printed in the April *FISH*. Motion by Marge Olson; second by Linda Hane.

Treasurer's Report: Mark Olson presented the March 2019 Treasurer's Report. The bills have been paid and the apportionments paid. Receipts: \$8216.00; disbursements were \$10,188.48. End of month balances: Undesignated Funds \$10,989.11; Building Fund \$9,642.25; Memorial Fund \$10,632.16; Parish Health Ministries \$400; R3 Project \$120.25; Gift of Giving Project \$15.16, Landscape Project \$218.78. Motion to accept by Linda Hane, second by Margie Olson. Motion approved. Beverly Johnson asked how the checking account balance this year compared with last year. Mark indicated that he would check into it and let Beverly know.

#### **COMMITTEE REPORTS**

#### **Board of Trustees:**

- Volunteers are needed to wash the walls in the kitchen and nursery after the April pasties. Brett Porthan will do the painting. Margie will let the UMW know about this at their next meeting on April 24, 2019.
- 2. Closet doors in the overflow room have been removed and temporarily stored in the back room of the sanctuary behind the blackboard.
- 3. Norm Rusco hung the 3<sup>rd</sup> handicap sign for the parking lot on the outside East wall of the church.
- 4. We are working on a solution for the leaks in the basement/ baseboard and tile damage due to water leaking into basement from melting snow. No action on this will be taken until the water seepage problem is solved. We are working with landscaping committee regarding the runoff.

- The basement outside door is rusting. Brett will look into it and determine if we can paint it or it needs to be replaced
- 6. The pew that was located in the overflow room behind the table was moved to the sanctuary and was added to the last row in the middle section.
- 7. The railing that is at the top section of the stairs going down to the lower parking lot is in the way for the plows. Phil Hegfors will make a sleeve for the railing so it can be removed during the winter.
- 8. Cracks in the ceiling of the church library need to be patched and painted.
- 9. Church Servants Handbook of Responsibilities 2 changes.
  - 1. We meet 3 times a year. April, July and October.
  - 2. Chairperson is chosen by committee membership at April meeting.
- 10. Two basement windows need to be painted in the parsonage and the AC units are still to be installed.

- April Pasties Report: 801 pasties made, 796 sold; \$4800 was deposited. Total Cost was \$1270.10, Net Income: \$3529.90. (Last Year: 936 were made and 904 sold).
- 3. April Movie: *Pieces of Easter:* 12 attended. The movie was shown in the Fellowship Hall instead of the sanctuary (consensus was that it was a good place to show it sound was improved with the sound system donated by Susan Germek). Popcorn and juice were provided.
