Ely United Methodist Church Members/Friends,

Greetings! Since 1952, the day after Thanksgiving has been regarded as the beginning of the Christmas shopping season. More recently it has been dubbed "Black Friday." It seems to me I was in my 30's or 40's when we started to see the frantic shopping with long lines outside stores early in the morning and then the frantic rush when the doors opened.

Well, there won't be any long lines at shopping malls and big box stores this year due to the pandemic, which is just one way the 2020 Thanksgiving/Christmas holiday season will be different. Yesterday was the first day in my memory I ever spent Thanksgiving alone. It went OK – I went on a long walk in the morning, someone in the congregation dropped off some Thanksgiving leftovers in the afternoon (yeah!), I worked on Christmas cards, and had texting conversations with family and friends off and on throughout the day.

Yes, this will be a different holiday season from any preceding it in our lifetimes, but it appears with a third vaccine being announced, that even though we still have some months and a Covid-19 winter to go before the pandemic is over, the end is in sight.

Since this all started last March our church leadership has worked diligently to continue the ministry of our congregation, to help us stay connected to God through worship, and connected with each other through a variety of means.

We've all been stretched, haven't we?

Item #1: We've been streaming our Sunday morning worship service on Facebook Live for three weeks now. This was brand new for us, so it's been quite a learning process. Last week our experiment to improve the sound quality by having Pastor Craig wear a face shield was a step backward.

This week Pastor Craig will not wear a mask or a shield when he is in the pulpit, but everyone else in the sanctuary will be sitting fifteen or more feet away and will be wearing masks.

Four principles have guided our decisions as far as masking during worship services.

- 1. Providing for the safety of all people in the sanctuary by exceeding CDC recommendations.
- 2. Providing the highest audio and video quality possible, along with a well planned and carefully "produced" worship service.
- 3. Adhering to Bishop Ough's guidelines for churches, whenever possible.
- 4. Maintaining the public perception that we are taking necessary safety precautions.

We've been using my laptop to record the services until our camera arrives. Yesterday, I learned I've only had my recording volume two-thirds of the way up. I've since turned the volume up to full, which will also improve the audio quality of our Facebook Live recordings, whether at church or from the parsonage.

Note: There will also be a children's time during the service on Sunday for the first time since we began streaming services.

Item #2: Part of our Administrative Council discussion on Wednesday dealt with plans for Christmas 2020 at our church.

- We will have poinsettias again this year and are offering you a chance to purchase one in memory of a loved one(s). This cost for each plant is \$14.00. You can mail or drop off payment at the church with a note indicating whom you want the poinsettia to be in memory of. As with previous years you may take the poinsettia home after Christmas. The deadline for ordering is December 1.
- Our Facebook Live Christmas Eve Service will be December 24th at 5:30 p.m. You may, of course, tune in at your convenience on Facebook Live anytime after that. I encourage you to have candles ready to light when we sing Silent Night during the service.
- The Minnesota Annual Conference is producing a worship service for Sunday, December 27th and making the service available to all churches in Minnesota. We decided not to hold our own service on the 27th and to invite people to stream this service led by Bishop Bruce Ough and other Annual Conference leadership. Watch for a link to the service as December 27th approaches.
