## A Note from Pastor Craig

Greetings! I'm writing this on Saturday, April 25. The sun is shining brightly, there isn't a cloud in the sky, and it's going to be sixty degrees outside today! Looking at the ten day forecast, it's obvious that spring is here!

And it couldn't come at a better time, could it?! Because, even though we recognize social-distancing is necessary to protect our neighbors, health-care workers, and ourselves, March and April have been two extremely difficult months. I think we've all had our moments of going stir-crazy – what I've heard old-timers refer to as "cabin fever." So it's going to be marvelous to get outside into our gardens, to sit in our driveways and visit with other people – all at a safe distance, of course. Stay tuned...

Previously Bishop Ough asked us to suspend all church activities through May 10th. As I listened to Governor Walz's press conference on April 22, my guess is our bishop's next announcement will extend these restrictions of activities in our building again. We'll see...

I know how hard this is for all of us. I am not keeping office hours anymore, but go into our church building several times a week. Each time I walk into the sanctuary my spirits sag. It's so hard to be in the same place where just weeks ago we greeted each other with exclamations and wide smiles, where we sang hymns with joyful hearts, where we left each week after services and coffee fellowship with our hearts, minds, and spirits alive and in the right place for the upcoming week.

We're told that in the early weeks following Jesus' death, resurrection, and ascension, his followers "devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers." (Acts 2:42) This what Christians have been doing ever since; this has been the pattern of my life as long as I can remember.

Except we can't gather together now. We can call each other on the phone. Those of us who have computers and Wi-Fi can participate in an interactive video Sunday School class. But we can't gather together for fellowship, for breaking of bread, and for prayers. With warmer weather, we're going to figure out ways to host some outdoor worship services and other gatherings. (See a note later in this newsletter.) But even then, it will be some time before we're able to return to worship and other activities in our church building.

Some five hundred or so years before the birth of Jesus, the twelve tribes of Israel experienced a similar dislocation, which lasted for several hundred years. During portions of this time they were unable to gather in any semblance of what they were used to. The Psalmist cried out: "How can we sing the Lord's song in a foreign land?" (Psalm 137:4)

Out of this experience comes the resounding voice of the prophet Habakkuk: "The righteous shall live by their faith." (Habakkuk 2:4) Or as Eugene Peterson translates: "But the person in right standing before God through loyal and steady believing is fully alive, really alive."

All sectors of our society are strenuously laboring to bring us through this horrible pandemic as safely and smoothly as is possible. It won't be immediate and it won't be without pain. We are working to keep our church's ministry as vital as possible.

In the meantime Jesus is our North Star. Our faith and our love for each other will give us what we need to live through each week and month of our present ordeal – and until we meet again.....

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# **First Steps in Planning for the Future**

• On Wednesday, April 29, our Worship Commitee will have a computer-video-conference meeting to review what we are doing to keep the ministry of our church going. We will consider any adjustments and/or improvements to enhance our present activities.

We will also explore future options for worship and other gatherings outside before we're able to gather together inside again. This is a priority for us because there just isn't anything like in-person, face-to-face gatherings; especially for people in our church without computers, Wi-Fi, and Smartphones. All future planned gatherings would include safe social-distancing measures.

The committee will forward a report to our Administrative Council for their consideration. Pastor Craig will pass along all new information, changes and updates to all through the weekly *Parish News*, direct mail or by phone. (See Below).

• Pastor Craig will continue to prepare Sunday morning sermons as usual and preach them from the pulpit in our Sanctuary each week. They will be posted on our church website and available each Sunday morning at: *www.elyumc.org.* Go to the "About Us" tab to access the sermons.

• We have established a church gmail account. The address is: *elyumc.elymn@gmail.com*. (Notice the period in the address.) We are using this to send out a short list of *"Parish News"* items weekly; announcements to help us stay in touch with one another. If you would like to be part of this email list, please send an email message to the above address requesting to be included. Note: all emails will come out as a "blind carbon copy" to keep your email address confidential. With their permission, Pastor Craig will also pass along updates with news from people he visits with in our congregation, both in Ely and and across the country.

• If you don't have internet access and would like to receive what goes out via email, please call the church office and we'll make sure you get a hard copy, whether in the mail, dropped off at your house, or by phone, if necessary.

• If you have needs for transportation, to run errands, or anything else, please call the church office, leaving a message if necessary. We have a group of people who will be able to help you out.

• As mentioned earlier under the title of *Contact Information and Office Hours*, Pastor Craig will not be keeping office hours during this "shelter-at-home" Executive Order from Governor Waltz. Please call the church (218-365-3355) or parsonage (218-365-3716) leaving a message with any questions or concerns, or just to talk.

• Our goal is to be able to continue the ministry of our church as much as possible while we're not able to gather together face-to-face.

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## IN TIMES LIKE THESE from Gail Haney

As we have been inundated with information about the COVID-19 flu pandemic, I recalled that my grandparents lived through the 1918 flu pandemic, and I searched through the family journals I have looking for information about that pandemic.

My grandfather, Elton Gordley, was a farmer who was seldom ill. Perhaps that was the reason he was the "Go-To-Man" when anyone in the neighborhood needed someone to vaccinate or give medicine to their sick animals or euthanize those animals that couldn't be saved.

In 1918, the flu was so bad in the neighborhood that Elton was called on to serve his neighbors throughout his farm community. Elton would care for his wife, Laura, and their two young boys, Herb and Ronald. After he did his chores, he would head to their neighbors to take care of their immediate needs. Whether it was chores, food, medicine, or digging graves for those who had died, Elton was there to help. He even hauled children to the cemetery in his car.

He slept on the sofa for several weeks, but he never succumbed to the 1918 flu that killed so many in the United States. I hope you have a neighbor like my grandfather who will meet your needs whenever and however you have a need.
